## **Reminder: Waste Connections Holiday Schedule**

In June 2010, Douglas McGill, Divisional Municipal Marketing Manager for Waste Connections of Tennessee, announced a change for collection of residential solid waste and curbside residential recycling pick-up days.

Observed holidays are New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Saturdays will be used as a make-up day during holiday weeks. The reasons cited are landfills and other operational needs are not available on holidays.

For instance, Memorial Day, May 27, falls on a Monday; if your usual refuse removal day is Thursday, then Friday will be your pick-up day that week. If Friday is your usual day, pick-up will be done Saturday.

## **STAYinTV Developing New Service Programs**

STAYinTV Committee has been busy bringing you our second annual Health EXPO held on April 12 and attended by more than 300 people. They also developed a handy Resource Guide for a variety of services of interest to not only our newest residents but even to our "Pioneers" who first came to Tellico Village. Over time it will be expanded, including more references in Monroe County. Now we are about to announce several new service programs that are geared to help some of our more senior residents as well as those with temporary issues that limit their capabilities.

Home Maintenance and Transportation Services will be offered to those in the Village with special needs so they can continue to live in the Village even though they may have some physical limitations. Our program is based on an all-volunteer approach to provide these services. The only cost to the client is for any necessary parts or any driving outside the Village, where there will be a nominal fee paid to the volunteer for driving costs. In lieu of fees, we do welcome donations to STAYinTV.

The Home Maintenance Program is planned to be implemented in the June timeframe when additional publicity and brochures will come out. Transportation should follow somewhat later in the year. A Home Maintenance Steering Committee has been working since the fall of 2012 to develop this new service. We have representatives from a variety of churches and service clubs: Fred Gibson, Howard Kastner, Mike Kittl, Don Littrell, Ken Mack, and Harry Westcott. Scott Mathot from the STAYinTV Committee is leading this group and he is assisted by Chris Garner, who is also part of the STAYinTV Committee.

The way the program will work is really quite simple: the client needs only to call an answering service number provided by the POA. The specific number for Home Maintenance is 865-458-7084; however, Kahite residents would call 1-866-983-5542 (POA's direct line) and use extension 4197. You can try this out and then listen to the Home Maintenance's welcoming message. We ask the client to provide their name, address and telephone number and a brief description of their need. We will have our monthly captain check for messages daily, and he will call the client back within 24 hours to better understand the needs. The captain, in turn, will contact one of our volunteer handymen who lives nearby and can do the work. We are starting with 20 volunteers in addition to the Steering Committee. We will have about five volunteers from Kahite. The volunteer will call the client back to set up a visit to review and, hopefully, fix the maintenance issue. If the request is too involved (larger project) or if the request is going to be frequent or routine in nature, we may recommend another solution. We would like to

provide the service by the volunteer in a maximum of one or two hours. Our goal is to help solve the client's problem!

Look for more information on these programs over the coming weeks and months.

### Kiwanis Club of Tellico Village Supports Loudon County Sherriff's Fight Against Drugs

On May 7, Chuck Hitch, President of The Kiwanis Club of Tellico Village presented a check for \$500 to Detective Jason Smith for the DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program in Loudon County Schools.

Smith leads the Loudon County program for Sheriff Tim Guider and works with more than 350 sixth graders in the county. The students participate in a series of nine sessions on how to resist peer pressure and live productive lives without drugs and violence.

The DARE program is funded using drug money from the Sherriff's office as well as contributions such as this one from Kiwanis Club of Tellico Village. It also receives some funding from Federal agencies. It is largely a crime prevention program working through education within schools.

DARE was founded in 1983 in Los Angeles and has proven so successful that it is now being implemented in more than half the school districts throughout the country. It was introduced in Loudon County in 1993.

The instructors of the DARE curriculum are local police officers who must undergo 80 hours of special training in
