Dam Bridge Traffic Flow Changes May 8

TDOT and the contractors working on the new bridge at the Fort Loudoun Dam will implement a new traffic flow beginning on or about Thursday, May 8. These changes will improve traffic flow and enhance safety at the site. The new traffic pattern will be very similar to the original pattern before construction began.

As travelers approach the Dam via the Tellico Parkway (State Highway 444), they will see a return of the option to turn left BEFORE the overpass to go east toward Maryville via Highway 321. Travelers heading for Lenoir City will continue under the overpass to enter 321 heading to the west. Travelers coming from Maryville on 321 heading to Tellico Village will still exit 321 to the right and circle under the overpass. Travelers coming from Lenoir City on 321 heading to Tellico Village will make a RIGHT hand turn to exit onto the Tellico Parkway. This right hand turn will not be an angled exit as in the past but will be a more pronounced right hand turn.

Drivers are encouraged to exercise extreme caution in the construction area not only due to unusual traffic patterns but also for the safety of the construction workers in the area. This new pattern will remain in effect for the foreseeable future.

Pace of Play Goal Is to Keep Up with the Group Ahead

With spring finally arriving and our greens improving after aeration, it's time to hit the links.

Tellico Village golfers begin their tournament season in May with the Men's Golf Association's Member/Member at Kahite/Toqua on May 3-4. The Ladies' Golf Association follows with their Member/Member May 17-18 at Kahite/Toqua. The Tellico Fun Day is May 11 at Kahite. The big fundraiser for beautification committees is the Memorial Day Red, White, and Blue on May 26 at Toqua. Sign up at any proshop for any of these events.

With play increasing, the golf committee and golf staff, LGA and MGA believe that a good pace of play is an important element in having a good experience on the golf course. It's often a combination of little things not done that wind up contributing to slow play and on-course traffic jams. Pace of play is not about rushing your shots. It's about being ready to take your shot when it's your turn and behaving efficiently on the course. Here are a few suggestions:

- Each member of a foursome (or any group) should proceed directly to his or her ball. The group should not travel as a pack, going to first one ball, then the next, and so on.
- While walking (or riding) to your ball, use the travel time to begin thinking over your next shot - the yardage, which club you'll use, and so on. Begin preparing before you get to your ball.
- If sharing a cart, don't drive to the first ball, wait for the first player to hit, then head to the second ball. Drop the first player off at his ball, drive on ahead to the second ball. The first player should walk over to the cart as the second player is playing his shot.
- When using a cart on a cart-path only day, be sure to take a couple of clubs with you when you walk from the cart to the ball. This way, you won't have to return to the cart if you discover you didn't bring the appropriate club.
- Carry a few extra tees, ball marks and a spare ball in your pockets so you don't have to return to your golf bag to retrieve them.
- When you think your shot might have landed out of bounds or be lost, immediately hit a provisional ball. Don't walk ahead to search, only to have to return to the original spot to

replay a shot.

- Watch everyone's shot. A lot of us don't see as well as we used to. It is also time consuming if we have to search both sides of the fairway.
- Never hold up play because you're in the middle of a conversation. Put the conversation on hold, take your stroke, then continue the conversation.
- On the green, begin lining up your putt and reading the break as soon as you reach the green. When it's your turn to putt, be prepared to step right up and take the stroke.
- Leave your bags or golf carts to the side of the green, and in the direction of the next tee, never in front of the green.
- Never stand on or next to the green after holing out in order to write down your score. Write it down when you reach the next tee.
- If all else fails, try playing "ready golf," which simply means that the order of play is based on who's ready, not who's away.
- Most experts say that a good pace of play not only increases enjoyment of the game, it can actually improve one's game. Standing around on every shot allows the muscles to cool down or limbs to stiffen up. A brisk pace can help keep a golfer loose and ready to play.
- Pace of play can be boiled down to two simple phrases: be prepared and be ready to play.
- Use the group ahead of you to gage your pace. If the group that teed off directly in front of you is pulling away - putting a full hole's distance between them and your group - you need to speed up.

To meet our goal of keeping up with the group ahead, here are three strategies we would like everyone to try.

1. **Ready golf** - it can involve being ready when your playing partner isn't, taking 3 clubs plus the sand bottle so you don't have to come back to the cart, walking 20-30 yards instead of waiting for your playing partner to hit, reading your putt before your turn so that you will be ready when it is your turn.
2. **Hit and Sit** - instead of wasting time at the back of the cart putting on head covers, cleaning clubs, taking glove off and attaching to cart, putting rangefinder away, getting more tees, etc., wait until the cart goes to the next ball. You will have time then. If everyone in the foursome did that twice a hole and it saved 5 seconds each time, we would save 12 minutes a round! It's so simple, but how many do it?
3. **Watch everyone's ball** - Remember the last time you hit a driver and didn't see it? For me, it was the last time I played. We need to help each other out. Some of us don't see as well as we used to. Standing behind rather than off to the side helps to follow the ball. Hit a provisional if your ball might be lost or out of bounds. No one enjoys returning to the tee and hitting in front of the group behind.

Please share these strategies with your playing partners. On a busy day we share the course with 200 others. Let's be considerate and keep up with the group ahead.
