General Manager's Report for May

Golf Course Winterkill Update

Your Property Owners Association has gotten several questions and phone calls over the past few weeks about the winterkill problem with our Bermuda grass on our fairways and greens surrounds lately. Winterkill is not a tagline excuse for turf woes. It is a real, regional issue for our courses and every course in our region.

We lost a total of one acre of fairway turf to winterkill while other high profile courses in the Knoxville area have lost 10-13 acres to winterkill. That's one acre on all three of our courses combined. Our fairways are much better because of their health going into the winter, and we raised our cutting height on our mowers entering fall. Several staff members and Villagers have played other courses in the area and tell me that our courses are in much better shape from the winterkill issue.

To address the issue on some of our greens surrounds, sodding has been ongoing this past month. Sod availability in the Southeast due to winterkill is a huge problem. The availability is the first problem; the quality is an entirely different problem. Our staff will continue to work on this issue until solved.

A little bit of information about winterkill: Bermuda grass is a warm season turfgrass that enters a dormant state after the first hard frost. Although the top of the plant (the leaves) are brown and appear dead, the underground portions of the turf (stolons, rhizomes and roots) are still alive. Winterkill is a general term used to define areas of turf that did not survive excessive cold conditions over winter.

What conditions contribute to the likelihood of winterkill? Extended periods of below freezing temperatures, periods of sub-zero temperatures, shade (reduces temperature), poor drainage, excessive foot traffic, insufficient or excessive moisture (leads to winter desiccation), or low mowing heights all can be contributing factors in the winterkill issue.

With warmer temperatures, smaller areas will grow in (Bermuda grass aggressively spreads laterally). The USGA defines smaller areas as a 1 foot by 1 foot area as of June 1 of this year. Larger areas will need to be replanted, sprigged or sodded. Most larger areas on Village courses have been sodded. Sprigged areas will take approximately five to six weeks to grow in, during which time cart path only conditions will be required.

Winterkill not only affected golf courses in the transition zone but also sod farms. As a result, there is limited availability of sod and sprigs. Also, the quality of available sod is mediocre, at best.

Jim West and his golf staff are keeping a keen eye on this issue and will keep the membership updated on our progress.

Pickleball Grand Opening
