Golf News and Upcoming Events

Golfers:

- Fix your ball marks on the green
- Sand your divots in the fairways
- Play more golf
- Play it forward
- Thank your superintendents for a job well done

We are well into our aeration process, and due to good weather and the overall health of our courses, the greens are healing rapidly. Toqua is almost completely healed, Tanasi is well on the way, and Kahite should be in great shape very quickly. This should make for several months of great fall golf. The process this fall was 5/8-inch hollow tines, single punched with lots of sand as top dressing. We are very fortunate to have three superintendents with the expertise, work ethic and networking capabilities exhibited by Chris Sykes, Mike White, and Wells McClure. Please take time to thank them.

The next subject is the condition of our sand bunkers. Except for the new bunkers on Toqua, our bunkers leave little to be desired, they are maintenance nightmares, there are too many, and in some cases, too difficult. But there is hope down the road. As you know, Bill Bergin of Bergin Golf Designs from Atlanta has redesigned and rebuilt several bunkers at Toqua. The new bunkers have excellent water diversion, internal drainage, grass-down faces and are filled with SP-55 sand which has excellent playability. Bill worked with Chris Sykes by allowing our people to do a large part of the construction thus saving us big bucks. Pending budget approval, the plan is for the remaining bunkers at Toqua to be completed in 2015.

You may have noticed additional natural areas planned for Toqua. These are areas that don't normally come into play, and by converting to natural grasses, there is a tremendous savings in maintenance costs. We had an additional, unplanned \$20,000 in costs this year due to winter injury/winterkill. Our supers are very proactive in this year's preparation for winter kill. They will be increasing the heights of the mowers for all areas and applying potash to increase turf heartiness. Our superintendents also found recent signs of disease on our greens:

- Spot pythium root rot at Toqua -curative fungicide has been applied (Terrazole)
- Pythium volutum at Toqua-fungicide applied (Segway)
- Anthracnose at Tanasi and Kahite-fungicide also applied (Cleary 336).

These diseases are common in wet conditions, cannot be seen by the naked eye, and completely curable when found early. It is great to have such knowledgeable and competent superintendents.

We have had several questions on how to handle competition from different tee boxes. There are two options, find the course rating for both courses, then the rounded difference in course rating can either be added to the higher rated tee players or subtracted from the lower rated tee players. In Tellico Village events and regular play, the latter option is usually applied. (See examples under section 3-5 in The USGA Handicap System.)

I encourage faster play when our courses are crowded and emphasize these techniques:

- Be ready to hit your shot
- Hit and Sit--hit your shot, get in the cart carrying your club, and when you reach your next shot put that club away and get your next club.
- Walk as quickly as possible
- Keep an eye on everyone's ball as it goes flying into the woods or tall grass
- When using a range finder device, carry several clubs with you to eliminate a trip back to the cart.

Play more golf. Play nine holes while the days are still long.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day Sept. 20

Household Hazardous Waste Collection will be held 8 a.m.-1 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 20, at the Loudon County Justice Center, located at the corner of East Lee Highway (Highway 11) and Sugarlimb Road. There is no cost for Tennessee residents.

Guidelines: Leave products in their original containers. Re-label containers that have lost their labels. Do not mix two or more different products into one container. Place items in a cardboard box, preferable lined with newspaper or plastic.

Items accepted are: Automotive/Marine Products: Fuel and oil additives, grease and rust solvents/naval jelly, carburetor and fuel injector cleaners, starter fluids, body putty, antifreeze, and gasoline. Home Maintenance/Improvement Products: Used strippers and thinners, adhesives, driveway sealant, roofing tar, and wallpaper remover. Home Lawn and Garden Products: Pesticides, fertilizers, wood preservatives. Miscellaneous: Rechargeable batteries, pool chemicals, photo processing, medicine/drugs, aerosols/compressed gas, mercury thermostats and thermometers, and fluorescent tubes.

Unacceptable Items: Medical/Biological: Needles and sharps, infectious waste, dead animals, nor any waste from a doctor's office/clinic or veterinarian's office/clinic. Explosives/Ammunition: Fireworks, military ordnance, gun powder, nor ammunition. Radioactives: Smoke detectors, nor radium paint. Business/Institutional Waste: No business, no colleges nor universities, no schools, no hospitals, no home improvement nor painting contractors, no agribusiness. Miscellaneous: Empty containers of any kind, automotive gas tanks, laboratory chemicals, paint, nor electronics.
