This week we'll focus on the Yacht Club Renovation PIC. Members: Jeff Gagley, Karen Broniecki and Bud Murray from Public Works, John Cherry from Public Relations, Andy Fox from AWE Hospitality, Peggy Baumgartner from the Public Services Advisory Committee, Steve Trudnak from the Architectural Control Committee, Villager Jan Miller, and representatives from Michael Brady, the contractor for the project.

The first task for the PIC was to take a look at and determine their scope of work for the project. Now that they have determined the parameters of the project, next comes making decisions on how to proceed.

At the first meeting, several items on the list of potential upgrades to the Yacht Club were identified for further development. Now, the Michael Brady team will come back in a couple of weeks to offer up suggestions, timelines and potential costs.

The PIC will then have to decide which items on the list are forwarded for consideration by the Board for implementation. It seems like a long process, but actually several small items on the list could be accomplished in short order. Villagers should expect to see changes taking place as early as spring.

Have Fun with Golf

One of the 2015 Golf Advisory Committee and the golf staff's goals is to increase play from the Tellico Village residents with the focus being on "*Having Fun.*"

Golf is a very "old game" in that is reported to have started in Scotland in the early 1400s. There are many different stories as to the origin, but all relate to folks getting together to "play" and a game was made out of it, and they played "for the fun of it." Golf is really an opportunity to get together with friends and play an outdoor activity while walking, talking and joking on beautiful park-like courses.

Golf is a game that can be played alone, with friends or new acquaintances and you are not playing against them, you are playing with them against the golf course. There are many rules, but no referees or other officials needed. You are responsible to keep your own score, to follow the rules and call a penalty on yourself. How refreshing is that compared to what we see going on in other sports today. Golf is really a simple game, the ball just sits there and all you have to do is hit it into a hole. The trick is that the hole can be 400

yards away and yet, those of us who enjoy the game of golf tend to take it very seriously as we try to improve. There are probably more golf quotes, golf jokes, and golf stories than any other sport. Here are a few:

- “Golf is like a Love Affair – if you don’t take it seriously, it’s no fun. If you do take it seriously it will break your heart.” Arnold Daley - 1933
- “Golf is a game where you yell fore, hit 6, and write down 5.”

Golf can be a bit confusing because it has its own language. Par, as in “par for the course,” is the standard number of strokes it should take to play the hole or the course. After that it gets fun – we have birdie, eagle, albatross, and even condors for strokes under par, but if you go over par it’s a bogie or double bogie and to triple bogie. We have tees, putts, drives, draws, fades, slices, hooks, duck hooks, banana balls, pushes, pulls, shanks, chunks, yips, mulligans, bubbas, and gimmies – if they are “in the leather.”

We play with a ball that has dimples, clubs that are called irons, woods, metal woods, rescue clubs, hybrids, wedges, and putters. We are concerned about bounce, sweet spots, and shaft flex.

We play on a “course,” that has fairways, tee boxes, bunkers, traps, aprons, water hazards, and casual water. And don’t forget to “waggle!”

After a round of golf comes more fun! The “Nineteenth Hole,” where we get together and compare how we did against the course with our playing partners. Sometimes there is even a bit of libation involved as we reminisce about the game we just played and how we did.

As you can see, golf is still really a social event as the founders created it in 1450. And, this year the Tellico Village golf staff will introduce more social and fun events, leagues, clinics and outings at each of our courses.

Look for these announcements, and come out and enjoy a friendly game of golf on one of our beautiful Tellico Village courses.

Once you are on the repository of all Tell-E-Grams page, hit CTRL F (Control F) to open a FIND box. Type in one word to get the best results. Typing in too many words or misspellings/different words may result in a lack of results. This trail is on Laurel Road approximately 5.5 miles from the Townsend “Y” junction heading towards Cades Cove. The first 2.5 miles has 350 feet of elevation gain, potentially muddy with a few creek crossings (easy rock hops when the water level is low). However, the next 2.5 miles has 850 feet of elevation gain and the last two miles are downhill.

Hiking boots and hiking sticks are recommended. Driving directions will be provided the morning of the hike. Bring water and a trail lunch. Carpooling is recommended, passengers are asked to contribute \$6 to the driver to help cover gas, etc. For more information, go to www.TVHikers.com.

In Dale Wasserman's adaptation of Ken Kesey's novel, McMurphy quickly takes over the ward and accomplishes what the medical profession has been unable to do for the past decade, including making a presumed deaf and dumb Native American Indian talk. He leads others out of introversion, stages a revolt and arranges for a rollicking midnight party that ends up having dramatic consequences. This Tony Award winning play was also winner of the 2001 Outer Critics Circle Award for Outstanding Revival.


Christian Men's Fellowship Breakfast Thursdays
