General Manager's Report for November

Golf Superintendents Important Part of Success

This month I want to highlight a part of our Tellico Village POA team that may go unnoticed to most Villagers: our golf course Superintendents. Mike White, Chris Sykes, and Wells McClure are three really hard working turf management experts.

Well cared for golf courses are extremely important to golfers, but not only that, outstanding golf courses add to the property values of everyone who lives in Tellico Village. Our turf management teams at all three golf courses do a great job led by Mike, Chris, and Wells.

Mike White has been with Tellico Village the longest of the three. He started working here in April of 2000. Mike has a Bachelor of Science degree in Plant and Soil Science from Middle Tennessee State University and is a Licensed Pesticide Applicator. Mike is also a Class A Member of Golf Course Superintendents Association of America. His favorite thing about working at Tellico Village? "Spectacular views! The ability to work in God's creation every day and enjoy what He has made," answers Mike.

Chris Sykes came to work for us in April in 2011 as the Superintendent for Toqua Golf Course. He says he played competitive golf growing up through the collegiate level acquiring his Turf Management degree from Virginia Tech. Chris has a real passion for golf courses and considers himself a golf course architecture aficionado. When asked what his favorite thing about Tellico Village, Chris says, "The overall environment, everything from the great people to the beautiful surroundings."

Wells McClure first started with us in May of 2011 as the Assistant Superintendent at Toqua. In 2012, when Pat Rose left us to move to Chattanooga, Wells took over as the interim Super at Tanasi. We quickly saw his talent as not only a turfgrass specialist but also as a leader. We removed the interim tag in August of 2012. Wells holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Plant Sciences with Turfgrass concentration from the University of Tennessee. When Wells thinks about the best part of working in the Village, he says, "having the ability to provide excellent playing conditions on the courses our residents call home." He adds, "The people we work for make this job very satisfying."

I also asked our Director of Golf Jim West for some thoughts about these three gentlemen. Jim says, "Our golf course superintendents are an integral part of the success of Tellico Village. They work tirelessly in constantly variable and extreme conditions to provide top notch playing conditions for our members and guests."

Jim says that what they do best is, “an excellent job finding ways to constantly improve the golf experience, while at the same time keeping focus on making our golf courses more sustainable both economically and environmentally.”

I know a lot of our golfers have noticed the excellent conditions of all three of our courses. Jim West does a great job explaining why that is:

“The cultural and water management practices, which go hand in hand, that our superintendents utilize is absolutely state of the art and cutting edge. They manage the volumetric water content percentage of our putting surfaces within a tenth of a percent, which in high-stress situations can mean the difference between life and death for turfgrass. Through continuous educational opportunities, they are constantly seeking new and innovate ways to more effectively manage turf.”

We are fortunate to have these turfgrass professionals working for Tellico Village. Our superintendents love to PLAY golf! If you are ever in need of an extra player for your regular group, consider inviting one of them – you will all have a great time!

Budget Highlights

Every year presents a challenging budget process for the POA, but this year was the toughest I have seen in a long time. We always strive to have a workable and realistic budget presented and approved at a Board meeting in the fall, and this year we got the 2016 budget done in November.

2015 was a year for Repair, Renovate and Replace. The 2016 budget has a bit more of the same, but we also have a few new additions to infrastructure that account for about 15 percent of the capital plan for next year. Finance Director Parker Owen’s article this month explains all of this in great detail.

To support our financial goals for 2016, the monthly assessment approved for 2016 reflects an increase of \$5.60 per month to \$117.60, or a 5% increase. Assessment increases also cover items such as inflation and rising prices for goods and services. Maintenance of Village resources and infrastructure are always important and are a high priority in any budget.

Other items of interest:

... There is a 50-cent monthly increase per water and sewer account to go toward Water & Sewer Reserve funding. Water and sewer rates will increase 3%

... There is a 3% increase in Recreation rates after remaining flat for 2015

... Dock and RV storage rates will remain flat for 2016

... Golf rates will increase 50 cents per member round and include \$1 to \$2 increases for various guest rounds

We will continue to keep a keen eye on controlling expenses as we go into the 2016 budget in January. The TVPOA Board and staff are committed to ensuring the high level of service Villagers deserve while watching out for areas to improve and streamline our processes.

Property owners should keep an eye on their mailbox as they will receive the 2016 assessment coupons and information regarding the details of the 2016 budget.

United Way—Helping You and Your Neighbors

The TV Volunteer Fire Department is one of the best volunteer departments in East Tennessee and one of the most respected organizations in the Village. Maintaining this reputation and its capabilities requires significant annual funding. The department raises funds to accomplish this within the community and to a limited degree with assistance derived from its partnership with the United Way of Loudon County.

Over the course of the last several years this partnership has resulted in the addition of important capabilities to the resources available to it to support the community. Two years ago a grant from UW enabled the department to add a high pressure nozzle for use in reaching tall structures from its fire boat. Most recently a grant enabled the department to procure a portable generator to use for powering equipment at the site of a fire and a portable cooling station to provide respite from the heat at the scene of a fire or accident. At the same time the grant enabled it to acquire a portable CO2 testing device for use in monitoring firefighters on site for inhalation of excessive amounts of CO2. UW will continue to support the TVVFD in this fashion in the future. The trail is one of the most beautiful sections of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park near Townsend and Tremont. The trail follows the rushing Middle Prong of the Little River, and features overlooks of waterfalls, cascades and rapids cut through a narrow gorge. This hike follows a wide old logging railroad bed up a gentle slope. Since the hike is between 2,000 and 3,000 feet elevation, the temperature will be lower than in Tellico Village.

Hiking boots and hiking sticks are recommended. Driving directions will be provided the morning of the hike. Bring water and a trail lunch. Carpooling is recommended, passengers are asked to contribute \$6 to the driver to help cover gas, etc. For more information, go to www.TVHikers.com.
