HONORS AWARDS

Eighteen years ago, the POA initiated the Honors awards, and to date, there have been 168 winners under this program. Every two years we gather together to honor a few of the many remarkable people that call the Village home. The POA hosts this event because it is only appropriate that we publicly recognize the Villagers who set the standard for their dedication and service to the community. During the ceremony two award categories were presented; first, the POA Honor Awards; second, were the POA President's Awards.

To be nominated for an Honor's award, Villagers were asked to submit nominations for individuals or groups they felt deserved special recognition for their volunteerism. In the President's award category, nominations are not collected, however awards may be given to a member of the POA Board, a member of an Advisory Committee or other individuals or groups who have displayed exemplary service to Tellico Village.

This year the Honor's Award committee received a total of 33 award nominations, which included 29 individuals and 4 organizations.

This year's Honor Award winners were:

Community Service: Mamie Ringenback created and implemented a storage bag program that helps people who utilize walkers for daily assistance. The bag stays firmly connected to any walker and holds a variety of items. Mamie has distributed roughly 850 bags at no charge to people in need.

Distinguished Service: Fred Toettcher co-authored marketing communications and brand strategies to re-launch Tellico Village's brand in 2012. The village marketing program has flourished for the last six years because of his efforts.

Debra Handley organized the Litter Angels to help pick up trash along Hwy. 444. Since 2015, the group has picked up almost 4,000 bags of trash and litter.

Education Service: Karen Hamerslag started out as a volunteer at Loudon County Elementary schools. Karen began the volunteer program by asking former teachers and others in the Village if they would like to join her and help. The program has now grown with volunteers assisting in the Loudon and Steekee schools.

Outstanding Individual: Harmon Towne has worked with the Tellico Village Lions, Tellico Village, and beyond Loudon County. For fifteen years Harmon has been a volunteer at the Fire Department.

Marsha Herzog who has led the Tellico Life Program, which is a vital website for Villagers and clubs of the Village. She was also involved in the POA Ad-hoc committee that developed the master plan for some of the hiking trails here in the village.

Government Service: WATeR's Garry Lucas, Jim Hawkey, and Dick Sawinski because of their work to improve water quality in the Tellico Lake Watershed.

Humanitarian Service: Peter Phelps is a 91-year-old World War 2 veteran who has dedicated a large portion of his life to volunteer work such as, Toys for Tots, Habitat for Humanity, and The Good Shepard Center.

Play dates are Thursday-Saturday, December 6-8 and Thursday-Sunday, December 13-16. Len Willis is directing and Tony Licata is producing Parfumerie. Longtime Tellico Community Players members Perry and Rose Sylvester are graciously sponsoring the production.

"Parfumerie" is a warm and gentle comedy that follows the tangled tale of Parfumerie employee George Horvath. Just days before Christmas, George's boss fires him after mistakenly suspecting him to be the lover of his unfaithful wife. Meanwhile, George's own love life goes awry when he discovers that the stranger he has fallen in love with through a secret correspondence is none other than Amalia Balash, a co-worker with whom he constantly feuds. For the employee of Parfumerie, only the truth can lead to a happy resolution in this old-fashioned, romantic Christmas tale.

Written originally by the renowned Hungarian playwright, Miklos Laszlo, and translated and adapted to English by his nephew, E.P. Dowdall, Parfumerie has inspired several movies. They include The Shop around the Corner starring James Stewart and Margaret Sullavan in 1940 and more recently in 1998, You've Got Mail starring Tom Hanks and Meg Ryan. TOYS FOR TOTS



The children of Loudon County need your help!

This marks the *twenty-second* year for the Loudon County Sheriff's Department and Tellico Village Woodworkers Club's "Toys-for-Tots" program. The program helps put toys under Christmas trees for many disadvantaged children in our local communities.

In 2017, the Woodworkers Club had 14 teams and 70 individuals build over 500 wooden toys and collected an additional 600+ new toys generously donated by Tellico Village residents.

The Woodworkers Club and Loudon County Sheriff's Office is asking Villagers and County residents to help the children of Loudon County by donating new, store-bought toys.

Pre-addressed envelopes are available at each drop-off location for residents who would like to help older children by mailing a check directly to the Loudon County's Sheriff's Office. Cash donations to "Toys-for-Tots" help the Sheriff's office meet special gift needs, particularly for older children. Our residents came through generously last year with donations of over \$2,000.

Toy distribution is managed by the Loudon County Sheriff's office, led by Sheriff Tim Guider. Debbie Hines, his assistant, is the Toys-for-Tots Program Coordinator.

Since the programs' inception, club members have delivered to the County Sheriff's Office over 10,000 toys. These toys have ranged from wooden trucks, cars and airplanes, to elaborate jewelry boxes, wooden puzzles, doll cribs, music boxes, children's furniture, and circus trains, toddler pull toys, rocking horses, artist boxes, easels and many more hand crafted wooden toys.

Woodworker Club members have transformed their basements and garages into Santa workshops, creating wooden toys to make this a special Christmas for disadvantaged children in our area. Please help by donating a new, store-bought toy, or making a cash donation.

Presentation of all the wooden and donated toys to the Sheriff's Office will be made Thursday, December 6th at 7:00 PM at the Tellico Village Community Church. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to come and see the wide variety of toys that the Tellico Village Woodworkers have made. Toys will be on display starting at 5:00 PM.



PET OF THE WEEK: SUZIE

Suzie is a medium size short-haired pointer mix, mostly white with some black on her face and ears. She is a young adult, probably a little over a year old and weighs about 40 pounds. She came to the shelter in August with two other pointers including her sister Mia who is also still available. Both Suzie and Mia were timid upon their arrival at the shelter. After many hours of tender loving care from our dedicated shelter volunteers, Suzie is now a confident and friendly dog who walks well on a leash and happily accepts treats and attention from visitors. We believe she would fit in well with children and any other pets. Suzie is a beautiful dog who would very much like to have her own "furever" family in time for the holidays.

All animals adopted are spayed or neutered, have age appropriate vaccinations and testing, and are microchipped with registration. \$40 adoption fee over 2 years old, \$50 under 2 years old.

The holidays are here and with it comes some advice from the ASCPA. Securely anchor your Christmas tree so it doesn't tip and fall, causing possible injury to your pet. Holly, when ingested, can cause pets to suffer nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Mistletoe can cause gastrointestinal upset and cardiovascular problems. And many varieties of lilies can cause kidney failure in cats if ingested. Kitties love this sparkly, light-catching "toy" that's easy to bat around and carry in their mouths. But a nibble can lead to a swallow, which can lead to an obstructed digestive tract, severe vomiting, dehydration and possible surgery. Make sure to keep your pets away from the table and unattended plates of food and be sure to secure the lids on garbage cans. If your celebration includes adult holiday beverages, be sure to place your unattended alcoholic drinks where pets cannot get to them. Looking to stuff your pet's stockings? Stick with chew toys that are basically indestructible, Kongs that can be stuffed with healthy foods or chew treats that are designed to be safely digestible. Don't leave lighted candles unattended. Pets may burn themselves or cause a fire if they knock candles over. As you count down to the new year, please keep in mind that strings of thrown confetti can get lodged in a cat's intestines, if ingested, perhaps necessitating surgery. Noisy poppers can terrify pets and cause possible damage to sensitive ears. Remember that many pets are also scared of fireworks, so be sure to secure them in a safe, escape-proof area as midnight approaches.

Shelter Statistics for last week: Intakes-10; Shelter Adoptions-3; Returned dogs to their owners-2. Both dogs received microchips before returning home.
