Financial Report

- · Year-to-date revenue is on target; total expenses lower than budgeted
- In order to cleanup title on the 3rd party tax sale lots, we need a guit claim deed.
- 11 lots need to be run through surplus sale in Loudon County before they are deeded back. Also working with Monroe County for their surplus sale.

Water Meter Change Out Program: This project will replace older non-radio read meters with new ones that will provide more accurate measurement and billing of water while keeping labor costs down. 30 meters will be replaced each month (approximately 360 for the year). Requested amount: \$91,800. Approved 6-0.

HA5 Pavement Preservation Program: HA5 is a pavement preservation product that will extend the life of our pavement for 5 years, pushing costly overlays into the future. Requested amount: 907,346. Approved 6-0.

Roads Evaluation Study and Report: This comprehensive evaluation of TVPOA's roads will include an assessment of current condition and development of models and scenarios for planning current and future maintenance and repairs. This project will provide expert guidance on the best way to maintain and preserve our roads, as well as guidance on the optimal timing of such preservation efforts. Requested amount: \$38,441. Work has begun and is expected to take 2 months.

Golf Vacation Rounds

- Annual revenue from golf vacation rounds ranges from \$30,000 to \$38,000
- Revenue is guaranteed and unaffected by weather
- · GAC February 2019 meeting voted to lift all booking restrictions on golf vacation rounds

Afternoon Unlimited Golf Programs

- Provides residents and non-residents with affordable golf opportunities during non-peak times
- Provides TVPOA with revenue unaffected by weather
- Year-to-date 107 resident packages sold, generating \$53,000
- Non-resident sales anticipated to begin late March/early April
- Through March 13th, total unlimited sales total \$315,133, representing over 97% of the 2019 annual projected sales

Finn Cycle

Cultural Practices

- Core aeration removes unwanted organic matter from the upper portion of the rootzone, relieves soil compaction, stimulates root growth, and improves drainage
- USGA recommends affecting minimum 20-25% of the putting green surface area annually
- Tellico Village's cultural practices affect 35-40% of the surface area annually

Managing Bentgrass

- Summer stress period (Memorial Day through Labor Day) is challenging because root systems can begin to decline when soil temperatures exceed 75 degrees
- Preventative measures are vital, including raising mowing heights, frequent spiking, precision hand water management, etc.
- Fans are essential to not only cool the surface, but reduce humidity to make the green less prone to disease and improve evapotranspiration
- Fans can be the difference between life and death of putting surfaces

Public Service: Jeff Gagley

Toqua Clubhouse

- LUB has moved the main power lines overhead to allow work to continue on the clubhouse. They will return at a later date and bore a new conduit.
- Footers have been poured and columns are in progress. They expect to pour the slab by March 29th.

Kahite Community Center

• Electric and plumbing conduits are in place and expect to pour the slab this week.

Following the Advisory Committee/Liaison reports, the Board discussed the PEC Committee.

The Political Education Committee (PEC) will serve as a liaison to Loudon and Monroe counties, as well as the state. Tellico Village generates a tremendous amount of money for Loudon and Monroe counties and receives little in return. Local officials are hesitant to provide monetary assistance since we are a private community and a 501c4 organization. We feel there are ways they can offer support. The PEC plans to meet with local officials to begin a dialogue on ways to garner this support. The PEC will also inform and educate Villagers on local politics. TVPOA would like all residents to understand our role in the county and become engaged in county politics. The PEC and its charter were approved by the Board 6-0.

Other

A motion was made and seconded to ask the Long-Range Planning Advisory Committee to delay the delivery of their Long-Range Strategic Plan until the POA Recreation Department has completed their 110% Consultant Masterplan Study and the POA Public Works Department has completed their outside consultant evaluation of the Tellico Village Road network. These studies should be completed by July 2019 and are critical to the future plans of Tellico Village and the 2019 Long-Range Strategic Plan. The motion was approved 6-0.

ACC HIGHLIGHTS

The Architectural Control Committee met on Thursday, March 21st. The committee approved the minutes from the March 7th meeting and reviewed four permit applications. Three were approved and one was asked to re-appear at the next meeting. There was a request for an oversized personal vehicle, which will be futher discussed at the April 18th workshop meeting.

ROAD SURVEY

Beginning Monday, April 1st, the TVPOA's Public Works Department will be conducting a survey of all the roads in the Village. The roads survey will be used to determine the condition of the roads so that we can make the best choices about what kinds of maintenance is needed to preserve, maintain, and repair the roads at the lowest overall cost now and in the future.

The survey is being performed by S&ME, Inc., who has an office in nearby Louisville, TN. The survey trucks have the S&ME logo and have a flashing amber light on the top. These trucks will be traveling slowly through each neighborhood, stopping periodically to measure and photograph the roads.



KAHITE CART PATH CLOSURE

Kahite's golf cart path has been closed for safety reasons during the ongoing construction of the Kahite Community Center. As highlighted in yellow on the map below, the cart path is blocked entirely, restricting access from both ends. SMOKY MOUNTAIN SERVICE DOGS

On Thursday, March 24th, a newly trained service pup was presented to a disabled 28-year Army veteran thanks to Smoky Mountain Service Dogs. Charley Jordan was a helicopter pilot out of the 160 Special Ops Aviation Regiment in Fort Campbell and a "night stalker" specializing in nighttime combat operations. During his multiple deployments, Charley was awarded Afghanistan Campaign Medal 5 Stars, Iraq Campaign Medal 2 Stars, Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross for Heroism, Meritorious Service Medal, Boeing Rescue Award, and 2 Air Medals with Valor device, among many othes. He retired in 2017 as a Heavy Assault Special Operations Aviator with the rank of Chief Warrant Officer Four.

Charley's farm story began when he returned to Tennessee in 2001 and purchased a five-acre property where he established Circle J Ranch. He produces and sells USDA-inspected freezer beef, freshcut flowers, and fresh eggs using the Homegrown by Heroes label. Charley is the founder and president of the Tennessee chapter of the Farmer Veteran Coalition and works with several other organizations and educational institutions such as the Tennessee Department of Agriculture and the University of Tennessee. He also



serves on the Board for the Tennessee Fruit and Vegetable Association. In what little spare time he has, he enjoys teaching yoga to other disabled veterans along with teaching aeronautical science to his students at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

US Army/Special Forces MSG Dave Brace named Dagger as a puppy after Special Forces Operation Task Force Dagger, which was the first military operation in Afghanistan after 9/11. On this special occasion, Dave ceremoniously passed Dagger's leash to Charley.

Amanda Wingfield, a faded Southern belle, who is trying to raise two children under difficult circumstances.

Tom Wingfield, Amada's son, who is an aspiring poet and works at a frustrating job in a shoe warehouse to support his family. He also serves as the play's narrator.

Laura Wingfield, Amanda's daughter, whose childhood illness has left her crippled with mental fragility and an

inferiority complex. She has a collection of glass figurines, and Laura's separation increases till she is like a piece of her own glass collection, too exquisitely fragile to move from the shelf.

Jim O'Connor, an old high school acquaintance of Tom and Laura who was a popular athlete and actor in high school, but has ended up working as a shipping clerk in the same shoe warehouse as Tom.

James Fisher is directing. Production dates are Thursday–Saturday, June 13–15 and Thursday–Sunday, June 20–23. Rating: Difficult

It's only a 5.6-mile trail on paper, but the hike is an adventure. I isn't a typical walk through the woods or big elevation gain – yet everything about the primitive feeling Honey Creek Loop hike brings fun, including the many names of the different landmarks along the way. Around each corner lies landmarks such as Echo Rock, Boulder House Falls, or Ice Castle Falls, and an enormous rock house called "The Great Room." There will be large boulders to climb over and some to go through, along with a "lookout tower" to climb, plus multiple creek crossings. Located at the south end of Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area, Honey Creek Loop trail is one of the park's most rugged and challenging trails, but this trail offers a little something for everyone. Although it is only 5.6 miles, hiking time will approach 5 hours due to the beautiful scenery, creek crossings, and boulder climbs. Hiking boots and hiking sticks are recommended. Bring water and a trail lunch. Driving directions will be provided the morning of the hike. Carpooling is recommended; passengers are asked to contribute \$6 to the driver to help cover gas.





PET OF THE WEEK:

Frodo is a beautiful black labrador mix who is a little under 2 years old. Frodo is eager to please, energetic, and playful. He is looking for a family who wants an active dog who will chase and retrieve a ball, play tug of war, or proudly walk on a leash without pulling. As a large dog, he would do best with older children and a fenced-in yard. Frodo does not like cats. He is well behaved and a quick learner.

Top 10 Signs Your Dog Has Seasonal Allergies

- 1. **Itching**. Is your dog constantly scratching himself? This is a tell-tale sign of allergies.
- 2. **Red, Irritated Skin**. Just like humans, dogs can break out in rashes and hives when exposed to something they are allergic to. Look on their belly and feet, particularly between the toes, as these are the parts of their body that touch things like grass or pollen the most. Ears can be another area that gets inflamed due to allergies.
- 3. **Obsessive Licking**. If your dog is constantly licking, he may be bothered by something in his environment.
- 4. **Rubbing Face on Things**. Most often, it will be the carpet, your pillows, the sofa, etc. Some dogs will try and rub their entire body across a surface to alleviate itchiness caused by an allergy.
- 5. **Hair Loss**. If the allergy has been left untreated and your dog continues to be exposed to the allergen, they can suffer hair loss.
- 6. **Hot Spots**. Another result from continued exposure to an allergen without medication, hot spots can cause the skin to be so inflamed it becomes very red and will even bleed.
- 7. **Red, Stinky Ears**. Often, there will be an odor.
- 8. **Shaking of Head**. If your dog's ears are being bothered by allergies, your dog will shake his head often.
- 9. **Redness of Skin**. Allergies will also give dogs red skin near their mouth, chin, paws, and sometimes the rectal area.
- 10. **Puffy Eyes**. Dogs with allergies often get puffy, red eyes.
